Appledore Parish Annual Meeting Thursday 16th March 7.30pm Appledore Village Hall

- 1)Thirty residents attended. The chairman welcomed them all.
- 2)The minutes of the 19th May 2022 were agreed. Proposed by Denise Stephens and seconded by Ruth Smith.

3) Presentation by Jon Pollard of Gusbourne - Vineyard Manager

In 2004, Andrew Weaver bought the wine vineyard and took on Jon Pollard as vineyard manager due to his experience in agriculture and wine retail. It had 61 hectares in Appledore and 32 hectares in Sussex, growing grapes for pinot grigio, pinot noir, meuniere and chardonnay as well as producing sparkling Brut, Rose and Blanc de Blanc sparkling wines using the champagne process. Ridgeview retailed the wine. Andrew Weaver sold up in 2013. With new investment, further 'terroir' has been added. The land in Kent is clay whilst in Sussex it is flint over chalk resulting in different flavours to the grape and different ripening times and harvesting. There are a further 32 hectares to be planted in the future, currently being used for grazing. In order to press the ever increasing tons of grapes, the winery has been expanded the number of press rooms and the 'nest' has evolved to provide 'Taste, Tour and Buy' events. Gusbourne now only sells directly building up relationships with retailers. It also now bottles and labels all its produce. A 'Nest II' is planned for the Chichester area. Gusbourne has been exporting to 26 countries for the last 7 years.

4) The Chairman of the Parish Council - Roger Hiskey

The chairman noted that it had been a good year thanks to volunteers who had assisted the council. Many had helped with litter picking while the council street cleaner Tom Hennessy had been ill. A temporary replacement had recently been employed. Volunteers had come forward and been trained for Speedwatch and others had offered their services to help in an emergency under the council's resilience plan. A group of volunteers were keeping our local footpaths clear and accessible and a few households had offered to maintain the planters at the new gateways. After just over 10 years the new 41 space car park at Court Lodge had been handed over to the parish council. Charles Wilkinson was thanked for this. More improvements were in the offing. The chairman thanked the council for their support.

6) Reports from Local Groups

St Paul & St Peter - Rev. J Kennet & Rev. Canon L Hammond

The church in Appledore was compared to an apple. The church building being the core of the apple whilst the flesh of the apple was the group of 9 churches to which it belonged. Thanks to the friends of St Paul and St Peter the Grade 1 listed building that is the church, is in good condition and it holds a central role providing a location for worship, pastoral care and discipleship. Online daily worship for 8-10 will continue. Regular services are held along with services marking the agricultural year. The Pet Service will return this September. Being part of a group of churches brings the benefits of greater numbers. The reflective service with breakfast is attended by 20 people every week. A trip to lona is planned for later in the year. The skin of the apple represents the love of God. The future holds challenges and we may all need some help at some time.

Produce in the porch is available every other week and sales money and any donations go towards maintaining the church.

Village Hall - Derek Winter

The hall re-opened on the 25th April and whilst it was anticipated that it would take a year to return to business it has only taken 7 months. Previous hirers have returned and new ones have come on board.

There have been a few teething points and the hall is closed on the 30th and 31st March for remedial works. Martello have also offered to install free of charge the new acoustic dampeners bought by the hall committee.

EDF is proving to be difficult to pin down to the verbally agreed rate and a complaint to the ombudsman will be made.

Low level lighting is planned for the car park in conjunction with the parish council.

Parish Magazine - Ruth Smith

I have been doing this for about a year and it has been a steep learning curve on the wonders of Microsoft Publisher.

We celebrated the village hall reopening, The Queen's Platinum Jubilee and commemorated the Queen's passing.

We have introduced a Village Hall page. I have had several nods to a letters page – do you want one? Remember, letter should be short, polite, relevant to Appledore and in good English. And the Editor's decision is final.

Various ides are in the pipeline – a look back to the early days of the magazine, a chance for the Borough Council candidates to tell us what they can offer Appledore. I would like to see contributions from all the village organisations.

As you know the magazine is free and delivered to your letterbox free. Most of the costs are covered by advertising revenue, the Church and the Parish Council. We

acknowledge publicly all donations and in the good old days, there were always two or three donations recorded on the second page. This has dropped off – over the last few years and this year we made a loss of £50. We send out over 400 magazines. To pay for last year's deficit and to cover a similar deficit this year, we need an extra £100 from you! Divided up that would mean a contribution of 25p per household!! Not a lot, and you might like to give more as everything this year is going to be more expensive. Donations need to be sent to Brian, who I would like to thank as well as the others.

Friends of Appledore Footpaths (FoAF) Gary Kinsley

The volunteer group, headed by the Footpath Warden Paul Ripley, aims to keep the paths clear and accessible. They work with landowners as paths are on private land. Recently, they have been working on repairing the broken slate on the bridge at Mill Hill and the farmer there has cleared the self-seeded saplings that were growing and blocking the view. Unfortunately, there are 3 paths that have been built over and with the assistance of the parish council they are hoping to have these paths rerouted.

Appledore Recreation Ground Committee - Gary Kinsley

The ground is managed by the charitable body that is the committee and not owned by the parish council.

The parish council working party 'Active Appledore' which includes members of the ground committee is looking at how to increase use of the facility and some volunteers help have tidy up the MUGA and tennis court. The surface there is now degrading and needs replacing. Funds are available from the Football Foundation to assist with the growing interest in juniors, veterans, women and girls' football or more leisurely walking football. If you have an interest in a sport for the ground please get involved. The pavilion building is of concern as the middle section is sinking. It needs shoring up and a viewing area would be a positive improvement. Income for the ground comes from the Car Rally and preparations for this are already underway. Ian Ramsden kindly allows his adjacent field to be used for parking. Improvements to the roadway and a new gate should allow safe two-way vehicle movements to it. The Car Rally is the 16th July.

The play area double swings have a new landing surface but unfortunately it has been damaged by users walking on it while it was still roped off and drying. Further equipment is planned.

Appledore Village Show - Dr R Smith

After a break for the pandemic, we are definitely having a show this year. The proposed date is Saturday 9th September and we have a new catering duo- Jenny and Linda. Jo Weeks and I together with help from others, will be running the show bit. We will still be making some changes but nothing too drastic. There will be the usual big onion, children's classes, amazing cookery entries, including the men's class, rosettes, cups and certificates. Details will appear at intervals in the Magazine, so keep your eyes skinned.

Trackside Clearance

Having Achieved Clearance of All of the Larger Items, (Rails, Sleepers, Sacks of Aggregate, Scattered Around in Close Proximity to the Station, it has been Observed that some 'Spare Rails' have Recently Appeared Opposite Platform 1. We will Keep a Close Watch to Ensure that NR Contractors Don't Slip Back into Bad Habits

There is Still Vegetation, Trash and Discarded Rubble Trackside of the Fence Along the Pathway to Platform 2, that Needs Removing by NR Contractors

Neighbouring Property

Coordination of Bus and Train Timetables would be Useful for this Limited Service

Tourist Map

Funded by GTR, a Copy of the Appledore Tourist Map, Gifted by APC, has been Installed in a Prominent Position at the Entrance to Platform 1

Vandalism

It is Sad to Report that Moronic Numpties recently Tipped Over 2 of the Planters on Platform 2. This would have required Superhuman Effort for One Person to Achieve, Most likely Two or More Persons were Involved and it would Not have been Achieved Quickly

GTR advised that No Useful Images were Recorded by CCTV, which is a Surprise and a Disappointment. GTR did Initiate Prompt Repair and Reinstatement of the Two Planters

APPLEDORE GARDEN SOCIETY

With 2022 approaching we cautiously planned for the year ahead, keeping visits fairly local and mindful that some members would be hesitant. The AGM was postponed until the February, and followed in March by the annual Quiz/Cheese and Wine night. Ten minutes before leaving for the meeting the Secretary received a call from the Quizmaster who was too ill to make the event. Establishing a Permanent, Independent, Centrally Located ALHS Home/ Heritage Centre

Having Experienced a Nomadic Existence since its Inception, ALHS Experienced an Unexpected and Forced Exit from its Rented Section of the Methodist Hall, requiring it to Secure Temporary Accommodation for its Records and Artefacts. Whilst Fund Raising Events can be Accommodated in the Village Hall, Organising 'Open Days' are Too Difficult to Organise. Monthly ALHS Meetings Currently Take Place at Members Homes on a Rotational Basis

Discussions had Occurred in Recent Times whereby a Heritage Centre was built into the Planning Application for No 1 The Street. APC Supported the Application but later Shied Away from Acquiring that Section of the Development in Favour of the Added Investment in the Village Hall

Discussions Occurred when Redesigning and Refurbishing the Village Hall, to Allocate Space for ALHS, but again there was No Positive Conclusion for ALHS

At the December 2022 APC Meeting, ALHS formerly requested that APC Offer an 'In Principle Commitment' to Assign the APC Owned Parcel of Land between the Public Toilets and the Pavilion, (Essentially the Football Changing Rooms), for the purpose of Establishing a Permanent, Independent, Centrally Located Home/Heritage Centre

In addition, ALHS Formerly Requested that APC Offer an 'In Principle Commitment' to Allocate a Sum, from the Ringfenced Capital Budget, (Remaining Proceeds from the Sale of the Village Field), as a 'Starter Fund' towards the Monies Required to Design Construct and Fit Out an Appropriate Structure for the Storage and Display of Historic Materials and Artefacts, as well as Provide Administrative and Members Meeting Accommodation

As Background, a Similar Arrangement had been Requested by and Granted to the ARGMC in respect of Proposed Improvements to the ARG Facilities, Enabling them to Progress to Fleshing Out Plans and Gathering Costs, along with Identifying Potential Sources of Supplementary Funding. The ARGMC were Tasked to Present their Plans and Proposals for Public Review and Comment Before the 'In Principle Commitment', Might Convert to a 'Commitment'. No Date has Yet been Announced for the 'Public Review'

It Was, and Remains, the intention of ALHS to similarly Fully Investigate Options, Costs and Funding Sources, However, APC Stated that it Required such Information Before Granting an 'In Principle Commitment'. This is Unacceptable to ALHS, as it would Potentially Waste Time, Resources, Limited Funds and Impair the Credibility of ALHS with Potential Funding Options.



The Last Message Received from APC, (15th March 2023), States:

Dear Terry

The reason for my delay in responding to your email 7th March is because I have consulted and discussions have been taking place between colleagues on the Parish Council as well as members of the Recreation Ground Management Committee. There is not a totally negative response as far as your two requests go- in principle undertaking to assign land and in principle agreement to provide finance: nonetheless, there is certainly no agreement.

I would ask that for the time being you accept, the Parish Council will not give the in principle undertakings you seek.

APPLEDORE BELLRINGERS

The Appledore bells have been ringing in our lovely church for a very long time and the recent history as far as I can discover is as follows.

Charlie Merchant was the captain after 2nd World War until his death in the 1980's. Fred and Gill Pearson led the bells from 1999 until 2007. All these dates are approximate so apologies for any errors. Other people mentioned in the recent history of the bells are Sid Fowle and Roy Moss.

Our present ringing master is Frank Wenham, from Stone who is in charge of the Appledore ringers along with James Boorman, second in command. Frank has been in this highly valued position since 2007. They have both encouraged and taught members of the team with regular practice nights on a Friday and extra lessons on muffled bells for beginners. On practice nights we welcome visitors from nearby churches to practice with us. This is a valuable and sociable benefit as we are then invited to ring in nearby churches on their practice nights. However it does mean that these visitors ring in their own churches for services and are not available for Sunday mornings in Appledore. At present there is no ringing for services on Sunday mornings as the times of services was changed without prior notice making it difficult for our regular ringers.

Throughout the year we welcome visiting ringers from other areas in the south east. The bells are also rung for special events, i.e weddings funerals, the flower festival and national celebrations.

We are now required along with the churchwardens and the PCC to complete safeguarding training which can be done on line or in person at St. Mildred's Tenterden.

Our AGM keeps us all up to date and is usually a social evening with a fish and chip supper. We also enjoy other social events throughout the year.

It is a commitment and takes a lot of practice but the rewards are great. There is nothing to match the pleasure and sense of achievement when you can be part of a service, which for me was one Christmas Eve ringing for midnight mass with my family present in the church.
